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#3. Symbolism: As you read, you will realize that Wiesel develops many symbols that contribute to the key ideas and themes of the autobiography. Identify a **minimum of five (5) symbols** you discover. These symbols may be universal symbols — ones that have similar meanings across cultures, such as religious symbolism or object symbolism, as in forests as symbols of the unknown — or they may be text-based, emerging from the story to take on a specific meaning. Then determine what you think the meaning of the symbol is. Note: Usually the symbol is a concrete object, while the symbolism, or meaning, is abstract.
