## Preparing a Works Cited

## Basic Rules:

- 1. Alphabetize by the first word in the entry.
- 2. Be sure to place the punctuation correctly. Remember the Hacker MLA guidelines are Simon in this "Simon Says" procedure. If using database articles, see pp. 30-31 in the Hacker guide.
- 3. Works Cited is centered at the top of your page.
- 4. Use hanging indents —first line is at left margin; subsequent lines are indented 5 spaces to the right.
- 5. Do NOT number your works cited entries.
- 6. Remember to list dates in the following order: date month year. Ex: 9 Dec. 2009
- 7. With new MLA format, use only italics for titles and names of media; no underlining.
- 8. If list by title only, do not alphabetize using a, an, or the. See "The Fat Tax" below.
- 9. If you have multiple sources by the same author, alphabetize by title. See the two articles by Hoover below.
